So far this year we have had 4 district meets- Anniston, AL, NYBS, Salt Lake Premier Show and DesMoines. Although Anniston and Salt Lake were small USC meets it is good to see the East and West directors trying to get a little publicity out there for the USC in hopes that they grow next year. Entries at Louisville and DesMoines shows were down a little but from what I have seen in person or via pictures it looks like the quality of the birds was very good.

Our next big opportunity to showcase our Swallows is at our Annual Meet in January at the NPA National in Louisville.

Highlights of the Annual meet will include

- Axel Nestler from Germany judging our birds
- There should be well over 100 swallows exhibited
- From what I have heard we could/should have 12 to 15 members in attendance
- And of course our annual auction

Speaking of the auction due to personal issues I will not be able to run the auction this year (I may not even be at the show at all). So with that said we need someone to step forward and volunteer

to run the auction. So far only 1 member has committed to donating items (Bill Griebel has committed to 1 pair of black white bar fairies and 2 pieces of artwork) and the combination of Mike Swanson and Frank Bailey have donated \$200 to help offset costs incurred while Axel is here in the US. I have gotten virtually no feedback on having a Loft Challenge (adding the 5 highest scores by an exhibitor) so unless the group on Thursday at the meet decides to have one I am cancelling the competition.

# **USC Judging Program Reorg**

This is an open letter to "all" United Swallow Club members. Midyear this year we, the United Swallow Club members of the Certified Judging Program, were alerted by our USC President Chris Auer that there may be a problem with our judging program. Our current judging program was set up by Mike and Cathy Swanson years ago when I was the USC president.

#### Here are the concerns:

- 1) Our current Certified Judging Program Pool is shrinking
- 2) Our younger members of the USC do not seem to be participating in becoming a certified judge.
- 3) Not enough certified judges at our USC Annual Meets without birds up for champion to qualify to be a second judge therefore a rating of "E" cannot be given.
- **4)** Our country is so large that it is difficult to manage the training of prospective judging candidates.

#### Moving Forward

Not long after the situation was brought to our attention a vote of the certified judges was taken and I was reelected Certified Judging Program Chairman. I sent out the following note to all the existing certified to get some idea where each certified judge stood on this issue:

#### **USC** reorg letter

Fellow Certified Judges, 10-12-2023

Several of us believe it is time we make some changes to keep USC judging program viable going into the future - the dynamics have changed. Each one of us on the Certified Judges list has played an important part in shaping USC's future from the days of Cal Breadhoff reorganizing this club in 1969 from the Western Swallow Club to the United Swallow Club. I applaud our USC President, Chris Auer, for pointing out to us that we have some major considerations to explore to keep USC on track in the future. Below are a few items that I think need to be looked at:

- 1) We have a shrinking Certified Judges pool. Yes, there are ten at present, but several cannot or will not judge anymore.
- 2) No new candidates from our younger members have come forward to become a USC Certified Judge. One candidate has progressed almost to completion but decided to stop.
- 3) Thanks to Mike and Cathy Swanson we have had a great Certified Judging Program, but we now may have to alter it a bit going into the future. As per the C&BL's the Certified Judges are the only group that change this document.
- **4)** Do we alter how an "E" rating is given? Do we change the process from here on out. Do we simplify it or leave it as is? In a recent situation the only Certified Judges who could OK the "E" award both had birds in the running for an "E".

5) Is it time to recruit outside, non-swallow breeder judges. A shrinking hobby kind-of dictates this. Even if we don't proactively recruit judges from outside the club, there will be an increasing number of occurrences where a non-swallow judge WILL be asked to judge our birds because there is no one else.

**6)** A booklet describing to "outsiders" how to evaluate our swallows has been suggested. I think it is something to investigate. We have all seen an outside judge say, "it has the best muff, that's your champ or it has the most powerful crest" etc., etc. As we know, that's not a swallow.

Going forward I will be compiling the information collected by this group. I would appreciate it if everyone in this group would study the 6 items in this list and give me your thoughts on each one by Friday, October 27th. If there are other issues on your mind, please submit them with your ideas on the 6 items above. The end goal of this process is to be finished, if possible, by next year's show season.

Our USC President, Chris Auer, will be considered as a non-voting member of this process as he was the one setting this discussion in motion.

Members let's get started!

#### A few Responses from the certified judges:

All but two of the ten certified judges responded, here are "some" of their ideas:

- 1) The program is OK as is, train more younger members.
- 2) Let a certified judge who is not present at the show determine whether the bird is an E by virtue of a video.
- 3) Revert back to the 123 system and only rate the top birds in the show.
- **4)** Reimburse expenses incurred by individuals trying to become certified judges.
- 5) Turn more club offices over to younger members, get them involved.
- **6)** Have an on-line training program. A daunting task at hand for sure!

#### Request of the membership:

I am asking at this point whether all USC members, on the Certified Judging Program or not, who wish to communicate with me on this subject please do so, your input is important. If you are interested in becoming one of our certified judges let us know. If you are apprehensive to participate as a judge - why? Costs, criticism, etc.

# Saxon winged pigeons, shield pigeons and swallows in the winner's ring competition



Where, if not in Leipzig, can these three Saxons Colored pigeon breeds in competition go for the golden winner's ring? With it, they are with the Nuremberg and Franconian ones colored pigeons the racial group, to enjoy it for the second time came to this competition to participate. Despite all the adversities that Leipzig and thus the national/federal winners' show in 2022 brought with it, the golden winner's ring was an absolute one Peak and the heart of everyone Colored pigeon breeder - actually every pigeon fancier - was at the sight blessed with these precious things.

A big compliment to the exhibitors for the condition and condition in which they presented their pigeons. That was advertising for these traditional Saxon colored pigeon breeds. A total of 324 pigeons were shown, divided into 35 Saxon Swallows, 231 Saxon Winged Pigeons and 58 Saxon Shield Pigeons.

35 Saxon Swallows were presented by only 4 breeders. A pity! Where were the red and yellow colors? At the beginning 4 black men with white bandages with very strong figures, rich color and well-groomed slippers. Strikingly very strong nasal warts for young animals (from R. Kreher). 6 blue ones with white bands had no outliers in the drawing, but appeared to be slightly fuller in the chest and more rounded in the feet. 5 pale blue horses with white bands with the finest color, strong figures and in great care. Small wishes regarding the bandage management (from: H.-U. Lemnitz). Blue-white scaled ones (6) with clear triangular scales, full flaps and also typical figures fit. They should be a little more twisted in the front flap area and better distributed in the scales. Blue-pale-whitescaled ones (7) are anything but common. They showed very strong figures and clear colors. Pay attention to complete flatness and more distributed scaling (from: M. Elze). 6 blue ones without bands had pure wing color, full swing and also full head points. They should be a little more harmonious in the foot (hv: H.-U. Lemnitz). The finale of the swallow collection was a blue paler without bands, which received the highest marks for absolute high-breeding. K. Hentschel was happy about this pearl.

The Saxon winged pigeons (231) are traditionally led by the smooth-headed pigeons (77). 13 red ones with white bands had a very rich color, broad tongue springs and classy bandages. ge (v, hv: M. Gitz). M. Gitz also showed the 10 yellows with white armbands, also of very fine quality. What was also striking here was the excellent care of these animals (v, hv). The pale blue ones



with white bandages (9) had appealing de color and also drawing. They could be a little more elegant in terms of the binding and the flaps (hv: D. Klemm). The main color of smoothheads is undoubtedly blue with black zen bandages (40). What's going on here look at the binding, the color, even the strap binding and the strong figure

achieved deserves the highest recognition. Here the smallest wishes were used for gradation. For





some, the front flap area may be a little shorter. It is absolutely important to maintain this high level (from: J. Sohl, ZG Laumann). Here you can that blue hammered ones (5) can't quite keep up. Although they had rich black hammering, they could have been a little more rounded in the chest area (hv: J. Sohl).

The capped ones are more common and were seen with 154 individual specimens. The black ones with white bandages (34) thrive on the intense contrast of lacquered rich color, long ties and very good construction of the flaps. Some of the edges of the eyes could have been a little fresher and the front tab area could have been more crazy (from: P. van der



Post, R. Kreher; hv: P. van der Post, K. Burkhardt). The blue ones with white bands (41), i.e. the blue wings, appear longer in the body. They showed fine color, pure bindings and, above all, the majority of them had racy bindings with a full hem. The flaps of some animals may be a little shorter at the front (v: C. Königsberg; hv: V. Philippi).

One could be satisfied with 23 reds with white armbands. Extremely rich color at the tip with the best bandages, wide and fully colored pin feather. Some should be fuller in the hood and cleaner in the bandages (v: M. Gitz; hv: M. Gitz, C. Zenker). 11 Yellow ones with white bands showed long bands and bright color. They also knew how to impress when it came to setting up and crossing the skids. Sometimes they might seem a bit stronger (hv: M. Gitz). Only 2 of the 9 reported black and white scaled ones had appeared and therefore did not allow for a real comparison. 10 red and white scaled specimens in a very fine quality with distributed triangular scales, rich color and solid colored tabs. They also fit in the caps (from: M. Gitz). 17 blue-and-white-scaled animals were very balanced in their figures and also in their feet. The scales were pure and the scale edge was also very fine. The slippers could appear a little more harmonious for some people. There are always requests for more distributed scaling (from: W. Götzfried). The "carrier pigeon colors" competed with 5 blue pigeons with black bands, but they couldn't keep up with the smoothheaded pigeons in terms of band design and color. At the end there were 2 blue pales, which showed that they still exist in Kappig.

The Saxon shield pigeons (58) were distributed among 31 smooth-headed pigeons,

16 round-crested and 11 doublecrested. The red ones with white bands have long dominated the smoothheads (16). They have very rich colors and pure pads, which of course could still be racier. In the slippers they should often be a little more closed at the back (v: C. Schaub; hv: A. Nestler). The 5 red and white scaled ones wanted even clearer and more distributed scales. They had strong figures and also good boots. The blue-and-white-scaled ones (7) were also very strong with beautiful head points, clear scales and correct shield markings. They should not appear so wide in the scale border (hv: C. Walther).

13 red men with white armbands started with the Kappigen, as the round-hatted people are often called. They also have very good color and binding system. In the pines they should often be a little more harmonious and more striking in the hood (hv: A. Nestler). A yellow with white bands and 2 yellow-white-scaled ones in Sq quality showed that work is also being done on these colors The double-crested ones (11) are always a special eye-catcher. It seems almost impossible to bring everything together with them. You won't find large collections here. A little carnation base should be worked towards. They knew how to please in terms of figures and color. The exceptional pigeon here was a black one with white bands with the highest score from R. Rothe. Everyone else won so-called and impressively advertised these rarities. Shown individually were: yellow with white bands (2), bluish pale with white bands (1), black-and-white scales (2), red-and-white scales (1) and yellowwhite-scales (3).

It's a shame that there are no Bohemian piebalds, at least for advertising purposes. ck, were to be seen. Nevertheless, it was a worthy



competition for the golden winner's ring. Placed with gold: Manfred Gitz (Saxon winged pigeons with round crest, red with white bands, silver: Paul van der Post (Saxon winged pigeons with Round hood, black with white bandages) and bronze: ZG Dirk and Fabian Laumann (Saxon winged pigeons, blue with black bandages).
